A Tribute to Jazz Man Rodger Fox

from Trust Porirua City Brass

In late 1964, Rodger's parents Louis and Betty Fox moved their young family from Gore to Titahi Bay in Porirua for Louis to take over the position of Head of Music at Mana College.

When Louis arrived, the remnants of an orchestra and a brass band were actively playing in the college. Realising that both groups could not survive independently, he amalgamated woodwind into the brass.

Louis was an excellent musical tutor and teacher and an accomplished musician, winning accolades within the Brass Band movement as a cornet soloist. With these skills, he created a 45-piece symphonic band along with a 10-piece drum core.

In 1967, Rodger, already proficient on trombone, commenced college to join a very active band that was well known regionally, attending, amongst other events, the Hastings Blossom Festival, and marching from Parliament to Athletic Park, playing both the New Zealand and French anthems on the park for the test and performing a display march at half-time.

As a means of encouraging college leavers to continue playing, Louis was instrumental in establishing the Porirua Municipal Band, becoming the City of Porirua Municipal Band when Porirua achieved city status around 1970. Rodger was the principal trombone and was an active member when the band attended its first National Brass Band Contest in Wanganui in 1971, winning the D Grade championship and then winning the C Grade title in Christchurch the following year.

Rodger always maintained a close connection with the band even though he went on to great things, having formed the Rodger Fox Big Band in 1973.

When Rodger's father, Louis, passed away in 1987 and the musical director's baton passed to younger brother Chris, Rodger was there as often as possible to support him. Rodger played as a guest soloist in several fundraising concerts, and his extended family joined the band in celebrating its 50th anniversary.

Those of us still with Trust Porirua City Brass from those days remember and appreciate that Rodger never forgot his roots and the memories and great times we had together.

Our sincere sympathies go out to Rodger's partner, Erna. Also, to Chris, Tony, Elizabeth and Felicity who have all been a part of our band at some stage. May he rest in peace.

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Contest Review

The 2024 national contest was one of firsts. It was the first time the contest was held in South Auckland, the first contest to have a theme and for three bands, it was their first national championship win. It was also the first time a band has won the A Grade Championship six times in a row.

The solo and ensemble events on the first two days of the competition showcased the calibre of talent in New Zealand and around the Pacific Rim. The beautiful performances at the Invitation Slow Melody on the first night set an extremely high standard. Congratulations to Anthony Smith, Wellington Brass, who won, having qualified earlier in the day for the event. Of note was the number of New Zealand works performed at this event, including by the top three place-qetters.

Congratulations to 18-year-old Walter Hughes from Hamilton City Brass on winning the Junior Champion of Champions. Congratulations to Mike Ford from NBS Nelson City Brass on achieving his second win in the Open Champion of Champions from 22 appearances.

Under sunny skies but with a cold wind, the Parade of Bands drew a large, supportive crowd to cheer on 29 bands. Many bands showed innovation with their music choice and interesting manoeuvres around the change of direction. Congratulations to Tupuo College on winning the overall marching and Champion Drum Major titles. The band looked terrific in their stunning white uniforms.

Following the parade, it was a quick turnaround to get the Youth Grade underway. It was fantastic to see three bands performing in this event, which is like a mini-concert, as bands perform a major work and a 15-minute concert programme. Congratulations to Auckland Seventh-day Adventist High School (Samiu Uatahauis and Hamilton Lee) on winning their first national title from runners-up Auckland City - Maamaloa Youth Band (Xiaoyang and Langi Mausia) and North Shore Youth Brass (Mark Close). The adjudicator for this section was Tyme Marsters, musical director of the National Youth Band, who no doubt spotted some up-and-coming young stars.

The Open Grade band events were as competitive and intense as ever. Wellington Brass, directed by David Bremner, wrote its name in our history books again by winning its sixth championship title in a row and its ninth in ten years. Addressing the capacity audience before the results, Dr Brett Baker said, "There were tough cadenzas and exposed playing to overcome in the setwork. The bands did really well, though, especially in the transitions and awkward moments." He said that the standard of playing on the Own Choice selections was "such a high calibre" and that some

performances were "out of this world on very challenging pieces."

NBS Nelson City Brass (Nigel Weeks) placed second overall, with North Shore Brass (Harmen Vanhoorne) just half a point behind in third and Immortal Brass Eternally (Kazuyuki Kouno) from Japan in fourth.

The B Grade contest was an international event with bands from Hong Kong, Australia and Tonga competing. However, it was the young band from Tupou College, performing in front of the Prince of Tonga, that won the grade. Speaking about what he had heard Dr Brett Baker said that the performances had made "for fantastic listening" thanks to "excellent, well-chosen own-choice pieces and in particular the hymn tunes".

Second place went to Eastern Bay of Plenty Brass (Andrew Leech), competing at their first national contest since 2019. A win in the Own Choice pulled last year's winners, Hutt City Brass (Matt Stein), into third in the aggregate.

Just .25 of a point separated the top two bands in the C Grade. Matamata Brass (Glenn Richards), with a win in the Sacred Item and the Test piece and second place in the Own Choice, claimed the title for the first time. Rolleston Brass (Raynor Martin), at only their second national contest, was very close behind with fellow Canterbury band Nor'west Brass, under their new conductor Nicholas Scott, in third place.

There was a special moment before the C Grade prizegiving when BBANZ president John Sullivan presented a Life Membership award to Betty Bremner.

It was a comprehensive victory in the D Grade for Maamaloa Brass (Kalino Pongi), winning all three events and giving the band its first national title. Despite the small field of competitors, adjudicator Michael Dowrick said that all three bands had given him "really good, enthusiastic and strong performances", with the Own Choice selections in particular being "really strong".

There are bound to be sceptics when using a new location and venue for our contest. However, the Due Drop Events Centre worked as a contest hub with four performance venues under one roof, plus the Parade of Bands straight out the door. The arena area with multiple trade stands proved an excellent meeting point, and the red Pasifika shirts of the helpful volunteers were easy to spot. There was a genuinely positive vibe around the venue as we welcomed our overseas bands and embraced the Pasifika theme of the contest. Thank you all involved for making this a very memorable contest.

lan Maurice Gifford 6 July 1937-28 June 2024

It is with great sadness Marlborough District Brass records the passing of Life Member, friend, and band stalwart Ian Gifford.

Ian joined the cadet band at Marlborough College in 1948 and the 2nd Marlborough Battalion Band (now Marlborough District Brass) in 1953, where he gave unbroken service until recently, and remained loyal as an avid supporter and follower. Ian held many positions within the organisation over the years including Chairman and Band Sergeant. He enabled many fundraising opportunities for the band by providing fieldwork with his garlic, onion, and sweet corn seed crops. Ian was a willing mentor to younger members, encouraging a sense of pride and bandsmanship whilst always retaining his calm, inclusive, and gentlemanly manner.

As a fifth-generation farmer in Marlborough's Rapaura region, Ian was fully supportive of the local community and very proud of his family history in the area, passing the farm over to his son Richard in the late 1990s and affirming his past and future family's commitment to the area through his involvement with the Rapaura Settlers Association.

Ian was a keen and long-standing member, committeeman, and former President of Rapaura Tennis Club, where he first met his late wife Jean, and later in 1978, with friends (and fellow bandsmen) Ewen Robinson and Ron Wass, introduced the now very popular New Year's Doubles Tournament week on the grass courts at Rapaura.

In his younger years, Ian played rugby with Marlborough College First XV and Moutere Rugby Club and continued a keen interest in the game throughout his life.

Ian cherished his family, farm, and hobbies, not necessarily in that order. His daughter Robyn fondly recalls their unique 'family holidays' during the band contest time in May. Ian's retirement allowed him to indulge in his love for travel, always managing to find his favourite snack, an ice cream, no matter where he was.

RIP bandsman Ian Maurice Gifford (Biscuit, Giff, Giffy); your infectious smile and calm, dignified charm will be missed by all who knew you.

National Honour

In the King's Birthday Honours list, Mervyn Allison was awarded the King's Service Medal (KSM) for services to brass bands.

The official citation for the awards reads:


'Mr Mervyn Allison has contributed to the New Zealand brass band movement and has taught brass in Wellington and the Kapiti Coast.

From childhood, Mr Allison played brass instruments in bands for 82 years until ceasing playing at age 90 due to health reasons. He has held several committee positions on various bands throughout New Zealand. He served as President of brass bands in Kapiti, Christchurch and Wellington.

In 1996, he was made a Life Member of the Wellington Brass Band and, more recently, a Life Member of Kapiti Brass. Before moving to the Kapiti Coast, he played with the Evening Post Onslow Band (now the Wellington Brass Band) for over 30 years. Since 1994, he has tutored brass students in Tawa and Wellington. He has helped organise fundraising events for the Kapiti Brass Band, and these efforts have allowed the band to put on free-of-charge concerts at retirement villages on the Kapiti Coast.

In 1974 he was selected for the National Band of New Zealand that toured Canada and the United States. He then played with the Royal New Zealand Air Force Band for over 15 years. Mr Allison also plays in a local jazz group of Kapiti Brass Band players and has performed "sing-a-long" music for local clubs and senior citizens groups.'

At the recent National Contest in Auckland, Alex Garrett received his 75 years of service to brass banding award to an almighty applause and standing ovation. He was lost for words!


Alex began cornet lessons at the age of ten in the Eltham Municipal Silver Band. His mother wanted him to play the bagpipes, but Alex decided against that idea. At that time, he was taught by Bill Elliot (grandfather of Mason Elliot). Alex also played in the Hawera Municipal Band under the conductorship of Harry Farrington. During this time, the band won the B Grade championship.

Alex became the deputy conductor of the Hawera Band and also conducted and tutored members of the Hawera Junior Band. He has always remained passionate and interested in the training and encouragement of young players. He knows that this is the future of any band. Many young players who passed through the ranks of the bands he has been involved with have become established players who excelled in solo competitions - many of whom Alex mentored and taught over the years.

In 1986, Alex and his wife Ann moved from Hawera to Tauranga and Alex took over the baton of the then Tauranga City Silver Band. He spent many months building the band and recruiting players he knew lived in the area. During this time, one of the big highlights was organising a sell-out concert with the band at Baycourt in Tauranga with Dame Malvina Major. The concert raised over \$12,000 to go towards new instruments.

In 1999, the band won the D Grade championship at the Waikato Bay of Plenty District contest and again at the National Contest in Auckland. Alex always said that he would retire from conducting when he felt his knowledge would not improve the band any more. So he stepped down from conducting the band the same year on a high but continued to play. These are just some of the many highlights of his banding tenure.

Alex has spent the past few years playing Eb Bass with Tauranga City Brass and, more recently, has returned to playing the cornet. His goal now is to reach 80 years of playing ... and we think he can do it! Congratulations on 75 years, Alex - What a legend!



Next-Gen

In this issue, Lachlan Spence interviews 20-year-old Will Leslie from Darebin City Brass - Preston Band, Victoria Brass, to find out how banding is the same or different for young players in Australia.

What was your first musical experience?

My first musical experience was learning the piano in primary school. I started brass when my younger brother started learning cornet with the Darebin City Brass Youth Group. I then decided I wanted to learn a brass instrument and started playing baritone.

What are now some of your musical highlights?

My musical highlights include playing in the World Youth Brass Band in 2022, playing in *Brassed Off Live* with Victoria Brass at the Melbourne Town Hall, playing baritone with Darebin, and winning open baritone solo at the 2024 Australian National Band Championships.

How did you enjoy your first-ever New Zealand Brass Band Championships?

I thoroughly enjoyed it. It was great being able to listen to every A Grade band and hearing some truly worldclass performances. There is such a good community surrounding the championships, so it was great to be amongst it all.

The thing I enjoyed the most was not being tethered to a band. I didn't have to worry about draws or missing out on any particular performances. It meant I could listen to every band and not be stressed about needing to go to a rehearsal or be in the warm-up room.

What made you want to come to the New Zealand Brass Band Championships?

I came to both compete in the solo competition and experience a different competition compared to what I am used to in Australia. It was also an opportunity to have a short holiday in New Zealand before university started again.

What's one thing about banding in Australia that you love and think New Zealand could benefit from?

I find it hard to think of anything Australia does that New Zealand doesn't do. The only thing that comes to mind would be to eliminate the prerequisites when it comes to the nationals. In Australia, aside from grading, I'm fairly certain that you don't need to compete at state level in order to compete at a national level. This applies to both the solo and band championships. The state-level competitions are still taken seriously, and there are still plenty of entries, so it doesn't need to be a prerequisite. That's really the only difference that I think NZ could potentially benefit from



What's the best thing about being in a brass band?

Definitely, how people can come together from all walks of life and produce an incredible sound and create music.

Is there anyone you would like to thank for helping you with your achievements thus far?

I have to appreciate my family for supporting my musical endeavours and enduring my practising. I also have to thank my mentor, Pete Caldwell; I truly wouldn't be where I am without his mentorship and ongoing support.

What do you hope to achieve in the future?

Playing-wise, I hope to achieve my full potential as a baritone player. Work-wise, I aim to finish my degree in engineering and then design electronic equipment for live

events.

Kumeu Brass Band celebrates 75 years

The Kumeu community came out in full force to support the Kumeu Band's 75th Anniversary Concert on 30 June. In fact, with cars stretched down both sides of the street, it was hard to find a park at the Kumeu Hall. And the band did not disappoint. Kumeu Brass wowed the audience with a preview of their technically demanding test pieces, which they would soon be performing at the New Zealand Brass Band Championships. Their own-choice test piece, Mario Burki's *Flight*, transported the audience on a musical journey above the Swiss Alps, featuring innovative techniques like players holding cornets upside down and blowing into the holes in their valves to simulate the wind, and timpani evoking thunderstorms and rain. This was music that few had heard or seen before!

Then, the Kumeu Vintage Band, with an average age of 77, brought a sense of nostalgia to the audience with familiar tunes such as John Lennon's *Imagine*. Musical director John Knowles on the flugel horn and BBb bass player Dennis Rive treated the audience to captivating solos during *Under the Boardwalk*. But what truly enriched the concert was the historical context shared by original band members Eric Cole and Derry Faulder. Their anecdotes about the band's early days connected the audience to the band's journey, making the concert a truly memorable experience.

A standout moment of the concert was when the Kumeu Brass Band and Kumeu Vintage Band joined forces, uniting over 50 musicians to perform a powerful rendition of *Invercargill*. They then accompanied Linda Filimoehala, musical director of the Kumeu Band, performing the beautiful solo *Nessun Dorma* on the euphonium. It was quite the sight and sound to have so many talented brass players in one space, and it was heartening to see that after 75 years, the Kumeu Brass Band was still going strong. Hon. Chris Penk, MP and band patron, acknowledged the band's longevity and ongoing impact on the community in his address to the crowd.

The celebrations concluded with an afternoon tea for past and current band members, during which four members of the Kumeu Vintage Brass Band received Long Service Awards from John Sullivan, the president of the Brass Band Association of New Zealand, honouring their commitment and contributions spanning up to 70 years. The Long Service Awards recipients were Judith Little (cornet player) for 50 years of service, Peter Lucas (Eb bass player) for 53 years of service, Bruce Sinton (tenor horn player) for 65 years of service and founding member of the band Eric Cole (cornet player) for 70 years of service.

Following the successful 75th Anniversary Concert, the Kumeu Brass Band continued their momentum at the New Zealand Brass Band Championships. Their performance of their own-choice piece "Flight," their sacred item, and stage march earned them second place in each category, securing an impressive second place overall in the D Grade Contest. This celebrated the band's achievements and highlighted their artistic growth, community spirit, and enduring legacy. The band's success at the championships promises a bright future, filling the audience with pride and excitement for what is to come.



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Formed in 1946, the Kerepehi Brass Band was established to provide the youth of Kerepehi with a positive and engaging activity, with the aim of keeping them out of trouble! At this time, Kerepehi Brass prioritised serving the needs of its local towns, never becoming overly focused on contests. This was reflected in the support the band received from the community, who funded the band's instruments and band hall (which is still in use today) entirely through local donations. The band continues to thrive solely through the ongoing support and contributions of our wonderful community and locals.

Like most bands in the 1940s, membership was high, and the band thrived. The 1980s saw a downward turn in the brass band movement, and by 2014, our membership had dwindled to only five players, with a plan being drafted to decide how the band was to fold.

The arrival of a new conductor, Andrew Christie, marked a turning point for the band's fortunes. Past members were roped back into playing, and players were borrowed to help get performances

happening again. The local communities were once again seeing their local band out and about.

Being seen performing in public is one of the best ways to attract new members, which proved true in our case. Kerepehi Brass has experienced a steady resurgence as a band.

In recent years, the band has expanded to offer music lessons, and we have established a junior band and a senior social band for retired folk. We now live by the philosophy that everyone is welcome. This positive and inclusive atmosphere is felt by all, leading to a shared enjoyment among all members in being part of the band.

Training more players is something all bands should endeavour to do. We have invested vast amounts of time in promoting brass music in our local primary schools, and now, a few years later, we have the students in our junior band filtering through to the main band. They are the future of our movement, after all.

Three years ago, the band attended a regional contest for the first time in 20

years. Building on that success, we put a bid forward to host the Waikato Bay of Plenty Regionals, which will be held in Thames for the first time on 28 and 29 September!

Rejoining the National Association again was the next step for Kerepehi Brass in our climb back. I am continually proud of the band for bucking the trend and experiencing growth when many small-town bands struggle.

Special thanks must be given to Rowen Garrett QSM, who has been with our band since its founding in 1946. He has been the rock that has allowed the band to continue through the tough times. At 87, he still comes to rehearsals most weeks with his Eb bass.

Although we are quite a way from moving up the grades, in a country of bands borrowing players from all over, Kerepehi is fortunate, through the work of its members and supporters, to have a genuinely local band with over 45 members who are loving every minute. May the good times continue.

Banding Together

One of the key documents for your organisation is the BBANZ Strategic Plan. Our highest priority for some time has been youth as we focus on the future by growing the quantity and standard



of our player base. However, increasing participation also comes from making banding as inclusive as it can be for all ages, genders and ethnicities. We are unique in that there are few barriers to learning brass or percussion in a brass band. Instruments are provided for loan or hire at little or no cost, while a local brass band is within travelling distance for more than 95% of New Zealand's population.

The 2024 National Secondary Schools' Band and Development Band will assemble next month in Nelson. With over 80 players selected for the two bands, it is exciting to see that 52% of these talented young musicians are attending an NSSBB course for the first time. What is also great to see is young players coming from new bands, such as the Addington TRAINing Band and the Auxiliary band

of Tauranga City Brass, plus players from established bands, such as Dannevirke, which hasn't had a representative in the NSSBB before. This shows that there is some excellent teaching along with administration support happening around the country.

The NSSBB shows we are progressing towards our Strategic Plan; however, there is much more work to do to ensure our movement thrives in the long term and reflects New Zealand's diverse population. As always, we welcome your ideas on potential programmes and initiatives to help make our brass banding community more representative of this amazing country of ours. Of course, if you are in the Nelson region on Saturday, 5 October, please come and listen to these two fine young bands, led by Vickie van Uden and Linda Filimoehala. I look forward to seeing you there.

Along with the National Contest, the other significant event in the New Zealand banding calendar is our Annual General Meeting, held each November. This meeting is not just an opportunity for all members to lead changes to our rules and regulations, but it's a chance for each of you to set the direction of our movement. Your input is invaluable. It is also an ideal opportunity for conductors, players and administrators to share ideas without

contesting pressures. For these reasons, it is critical we increase participation at the AGM, so again, the National Executive will organise workshop sessions as part of the weekend.

This year's workshops will include sessions on the new Incorporated Societies Act, Adjudication, Formation of Youth/Academy bands, Fundraising, National Contests and Starting Brass Musicians. There is something for everyone, and thank you to everyone who offered suggestions for workshop topics. So join us in Christchurch for these educational workshops on Saturday, 9 November. There will also be a social event on Saturday night with a keynote guest speaker and then the all-important AGM on Sunday, 10 November.

This conference weekend is an exciting opportunity to engage with a broad cross-section of our members; remember, this is your organisation, so get involved and help guide us.

Colours of Brass

The Auckland Philharmonia's brass-focussed concert on 31 October will see the world premiere of a work by New Zealand composer Gemma Peacocke.

The programme for Baroque & Beyond: Colours of Brass, directed by Huw Dann, includes *The Earl of Oxford's March* (Byrd), *Sonata pian' e forte* (Gabrieli) *Adagio in G minor* (Giazotto), *The Prince of Denmark's March* (Clarke), along with the world premiere *Don't You Trust Me?* by Gemma Peacocke.

The majesty and grandeur of brass instruments have been celebrated since the Renaissance. Not just for their power, either. They're thrilling when played softly, too, and indeed, the title of Giovanni Gabrieli's piece means 'Quiet and Loud Sonata' because it was one of the first pieces to specify the level of volume with which the instruments should be played.

This programme explores brass music from Elizabethan England to the present day, with New Zealander Gemma Peacocke being the latest composer to fall under its spell.

Originally from Hamilton, Gemma Peacocke studied at the New Zealand School of Music, New York University Steinhardt School and holds a joint PhD in Music and Humanistic Studies at Princeton University, New Jersey. She has a particular interest in interdisciplinary projects. Her first album, Waves & Lines, which sets poems by Afghan women, was released in March 2019.

Gemma is co-founder of the Kinds of Kings composer collective, which focuses on amplifying and advocating for under-heard voices in classical music.

Along with the Auckland Philharmonia, Gemma has been commissioned by Christchurch Symphony Orchestra, Rochester Philharmonic, Third Coast Percussion, PUBLIQuartet, Bang on a Can, Rubiks Collective, Stroma, and Alarm Will Sound.







Incorporated Societies Act 2022

The clock is clicking as the new regulations come into effect on 5 October 2023. You have until 5 April 2026 to reregister your Society. If you don't reregister by then, you will need to appoint a Liquidator or apply for your society to be dissolved. If you do nothing your society will cease to exist after 5 April 2026.

What reregistration means:

The reregistration process will involve reregistering your society on the Incorporated Societies Register and providing an up-to-date rules document (which will now be called a constitution). After reregistration, your society will continue operating as the same legal entity it has always been.

It is very important that your society actively decides whether to reregister. The 2022 Act modernises the way societies operate. It is more comprehensive than the 1908 Act and will help to integrate best practice processes into all societies (for example, ensuring societies have good mechanisms in place for handling internal disputes and preparing financial statements to a consistent set of standards). The 2022 Act places a stronger emphasis on officers acting in the best interest of the society, not its members.

Things to do before you apply:

You will need to prepare a constitution that meets the requirements of the 2022 Act. Your society might also need to adopt some new processes to comply with the 2022 Act.

You will need to hold at least one general meeting to approve the constitution and decide on other features of your society (such as who will be on the committee and whether you will appoint other officers).

Getting Started

1. Make an initial assessment of what reregistering would mean for your society

Your society needs to make an informed decision about the best way forward, and each society is different.

Your society might already operate in a way that's close to what the 2022 Act requires, so you might only need to make small changes.

On the other hand, your society might need to make several changes to comply with the 2022 Act.

2. Meet with your members to decide on reregistering

Organise a general meeting to outline the options and get agreement from your society's members to proceed with reregistration. You could consider tying this in with your Annual General Meeting (AGM).

At this meeting, your members should agree on when might be best to apply for reregistration - such as, would it suit best to apply at the start of a new financial year?

From there, you can plan for the other things you need to prepare, such as a constitution that complies with the 2022 Act.

3. Review your operational processes

You need to review your operational processes to make sure they will comply with the 2022 Act. For example, your society must have processes —

- to manage internal disputes in a way that's consistent with natural justice.
- that ensure new members give their consent to being a member.
- for recording all the details required in your register of members.
- for getting and storing the written consent for each new officer to act as an officer.
- for disclosing and recording any conflicts of interest (if you don't already have one, your committee will need to create an 'Interests Register' for this purpose)
- for preparing your financial statements to the appropriate standards (You may need to capture individual transactions in a way that makes it easy to create the required financial statements).

4. Review your society's balance date

The end of the financial year (balance date) plays an important role in determining other deadlines. In particular, within 6 months of the balance date, your society must —

prepare its annual financial statements, and hold its Annual General Meeting (AGM), and present its financial statements to the AGM, and

file an annual return with us, along with its annual financial statements.

5. Draft a constitution

Your society will have a set of rules that contains provisions required under the 1908 Act. To reregister, your society must have a constitution that contains provisions required under section 26 of the 2022 Act.

In the 2022 Act, a society's rules are called its constitution. The 2022 Act sets out in quite a lot of detail what matters must be included in a society's constitution.

You will need to review each of your society's rules to make sure they comply with the 2022 Act — even if you have made changes quite recently. This is because for some rules, the requirements of the 2022 Act are different than the 1908 Act.

Your society might also need to add new rules or change some existing ones. For

instance, your society might need to add rules that are compulsory under the 2022 Act, such as —

- the need to have at least one contact person and no more than three. You must also include how each contact person is elected or appointed.
- how members and officers give their consent
- dispute resolution clauses and
- whether and how written resolutions may be passed instead of holding general meetings.
- choose to remove the rule requiring it to have a common seal (a common seal is not mandatory under the 2022 Act).
- change rules as appropriate to reflect that the 2022 Act places most responsibilities on the whole committee rather than the individual roles, such as the secretary or treasurer.

6. Meet with your members to finalise your reregistration application

When you apply for reregistration, you will need to provide certain information about your society along with a copy of your society's constitution. To finalise this information, you will need to hold a general meeting. At this meeting, your members

- approve the constitution.
- agree on the operational processes you've reviewed in step 3 above.
- decide who the officers will be (your society's committee plus any other officers it may need).
- decide who the contact person will be there must be at least one and no more than three. (The contact person's details are only for the Registrar to use).
- formally agree to reregister under the 2022 Act.

What is AoBBA?

Following Dr Brett Baker's visit to
New Zealand, we asked him for some
information on The Association of Brass
Band Adjudicators, of which he is the
Chair. Through Brett, we were introduced
to Nicholas Garman, the secretary of The
Association of Brass Band Adjudicators, who
has kindly prepared the following article for
the Mouthpiece.

Nicholas Garman has been the secretary of AoBBA since 2018, having previously been the Association's Trainee Scheme Mentor. He is the conductor of the Ratby Mid Band and has won various brass band honours as a cornet player with the GUS band. This year, Nicholas has adjudicated at local, national and international contests, including the North American Brass Band Championships. He is also an examiner for the London College of Music Examinations board and travels globally in this role (in fact, he wrote this article while in Hanoi!)

AoBBA was formed in 1999 by a group of leading adjudicators under the guidance of the first Chairperson, Dr Roy Newsome. It was formed to provide a collective for brass band adjudicators who wished to ensure the professionalism of people being invited to adjudicate. Today, there are more than 90 members who reside around the world. Our website, www.aobba.com provides a directory of our members and much more information besides.

Our mission is 'Delivering professional and experienced adjudication for the modern brass band contest', and we do this in several ways.

A previous Chairperson, Alan Morrison, devised our PAC (Performance Assessment Criteria - found in the resources section of our website www.aobba.com/resources), which is the fundamental document for the adjudication process of all our members. It clearly states the most important factors in providing a contest with a result, including which elements of performance are the baseline for adjudication (correct notes and rhythm, etc) and also takes into account the nuances of subjectivity. This is the last factor used to decide a placing. No more hours spent looking at previous written remarks to discover what one adjudicator favours over another!

Written remarks are still the basis for most brass band contests. This is a topic we return to many times over at our annual general meeting, which is one of two occasions in a year members are given (and expected to attend) continued professional development (CPD). It is not enough for our members to write one bullet point on a twenty-minute performance – hardly professional reporting. However, we also know that several of our members have judged at contests (myself included), where other comment 'writing' is

generated using spoken comments on a live performance. This is a planned topic of CPD for members within the next six months.

Other CPD our members have received include topics on being aware of the mental well-being of performers receiving constructive (we hope!) criticism, being mindful of special educational needs of both young and mature performers alike, preparing a score for adjudication, speaking from the stage and many, many more. We also regularly partake in peer assessment to ensure the quality of adjudication across the membership.

AoBBA represents its members when meeting with contest organisers and the banding public, though there are also some misconceptions about what we do. For example, we do not represent all adjudicators, only those who are members. We do not choose test pieces nor assign adjudicators to contests. Both of those are solely at the discretion of a contest organiser.

Our membership is growing, particularly through the highly successful trainee adjudicator scheme. As a previous trainee, the invaluable experience gained on this scheme equipped me with the skills needed. When invited to adjudicate, I was wholly familiar with expectations and processes. More information about the trainee scheme can be found here: www.aobba.com/applyfor-membership

As a brief introduction, trainees receive mentoring from the current Programme Leader and complete six assignments across two years of all types of contests where they shadow an executive committee (or other) member. Paperwork is presented to the Programme Leader, who provides feedback, and finally, the trainee is presented to the Executive for full membership if they have been successful over the training period.

Application forms can be found via the link above. Once completed and returned to the secretary, the Executive Committee (who meet once a quarter) has a standing Agenda point to discuss applicants and the next steps are then explained to the applicant (whether successful or why an application may be turned down).

We recently established the first forum for

contest organisers and adjudicators so that good practice may be shared and any other topics brought to our attention.

AoBBA is the only body for brass band adjudicators, and the contest organisers who invite our members to adjudicate benefit from support from the association from the initial invitation through to post-contest and future contests.

Being an adjudicator is not the same as being a player, conductor, composer or teacher. There are some people who are excellent in all these disciplines, and I envy them. But having a discerning ear, being able to produce quality, constructive feedback (written or verbal), possessing the insightfulness to prepare a score, having the mental and physical stamina to ensure band 75 (if at Whit Friday!) is given the same attention as band 1, being able to speak from the stage clearly and concisely, having a thick skin (sometimes!) whilst smiling and, most importantly, enjoying the job are things you will find in the membership of AoBBA.

Finally, I am writing this just a few days after the funeral of one of AoBBA's most respected members, David Read MBE. I know he wouldn't have minded me sharing this story with you.

After adjudicating at a particular contest, David was stopped by an audience member who stated that they did not agree with the result. Rather than turning away, David engaged the person in conversation, something they were not expecting!

'Alright,' David said, 'That's all very well, but who did you have in 15th (place), and did you listen to all the bands, and did you sit in the same place throughout, and did you have a score? If you did, then you're entitled to your opinion, but today, I was the adjudicator.' Of course, he was only invited to be the adjudicator because he had the qualities mentioned.

News from Levin and Districts Brass

For over two decades Levin and Districts Brass has been represented at every National Contest and WDBBA Contest while maintaining a high profile in the local community with numerous performances and playouts. Here is a roundup of our recent news, events and activities.

In July 2022, Colin Honey retired as the band's Musical Director after 13 years in the role, his highlights being winning the C Grade at the National Contest in Napier (in 2009) early in his tenure

and, in the same 12-month period, the band being crowned Wellington District Champions and Central District Champions.

Mat Johnston took up the baton and conducted the band at the 2023 National Contest in Dunedin, gaining first place for music on the march in the C Grade (playing *Victoria*) and third place in the Own Choice (*Olympus*).

Mat stepped aside upon returning from Dunedin, and David Maas was appointed Musical Director and recently conducted the band at the National Championships in Manukau, with the band again placing third in the C Grade Own Choice, playing *Renaissance*.

December is always an extremely busy time for the band. During this past festive season, members were out carolling for a total of 29 hours, comprising New World Christmas Club days, visiting all pubs and clubs in town on the Friday before Christmas, eight hours at The Warehouse on the Saturday before Christmas, and taking part in community Carols by Candlelight service – all welcome opportunities to shake the donation box.

On 2 January, a fundraising highlight for the band was hosting the 40th Anniversary of the Big Dig at Waitarere Beach, where the largest attendance ever was recorded, with over 1,500 hopefuls digging and over \$6,500 raised.

The Lawton family has been part of Levin and Districts Brass since the 1960s: father Graham (now 89 and living in a rest home in Levin), a Life Member, past conductor and player; son Chris (Nelson), a Life Member, past conductor and currently registered Levin bandsman; and son Stephen, percussionist extraordinaire (and Champion Drum Major). Steve made his home in the Manawatu and was a Life Member and Past President of the Feilding Brass Band. Steve kept his link to Levin Brass strong, attending almost every National Contest with Levin over the past two decades. In February, it was with great sadness that the band learned that Steve had lost his brave battle with cancer.



Members of Levin Brass joined an 80-plusstrong band at Steve's funeral. Steve's energy, enthusiasm, skill and commitment will be missed by all in the brass band whanau.

On the last Sunday in February each year, Levin hosts and performs at Jazz in the Park, and on the last Sunday in March hosts and performs at Brass in the Park – both events taking place in the Levin Adventure Park. The March 2024 event featured Kapiti Brass, Feilding Brass, Buzzing Brass, and Levin and Districts Brass.

On Friday, 8 March, the combined bands of The Salvation Army Levin Corps and Levin and Districts Brass took part in Ōtaki College's annual wreath-laying service, commemorating the sinking of the SS Otaki in 1917. The focus of the 2024 Commemoration was the 80th anniversary of the D-Day Landings, which took place on 6 June 1944. We are happy that we could continue our support of the college in this important event in their school calendar, having done so every year since first invited in 2018.

The 2024 Wellington District Solo and Party Contest, held in Masterton in May, saw Levin and Districts Brass have its most successful results in recent memory when gaining five first placings - David Maas in both the Open Slow Melody and Open Air Varie, Graham Smith in the Masters Air Varie, Hugh Maas in the under 15 solo, and Brian Stewart and Mat Johnston in the Open Duet. Further success was achieved at the National Contest in Manukau when Graham Smith won the 65 to 74 age group in the Masters solo, and Aiden West won the Junior Soprano Cornet. The band is also proud of two youth members who were selected for the 2024 National Secondary Schools' Brass Band, Hugh Maas on trombone and Bella Price on cornet.

Another highlight at the contest was winning a fantastic Courtois AC280BO large bore Bb/F trombone, valued at \$3995, in a competition run by ABI. The new trombone has given to our long-time 1st trombone player, Glenn Walbran. He loves it, and said it is great to

play. The trombone Glen was playing has been passed down the line to 2nd trombone player Hugh Maas.

In November 2023, the Levin band was invited by Marching Wellington to provide live music for their annual marching competition day at the Palmerston North Showgrounds. The band played for two march-pasts and over fifteen march team performances over three hours from a selection of five popular brass band marches. The day was a great success, and word quickly spread to Marching New Zealand, resulting in the band being invited to perform at the New Zealand and Australia Marching and Drill Dance Tattoo 2024 held at the TSB Arena, Wellington, on Saturday 27 July.

The band is currently rehearsing for the combined Wellington/Central District Contest to be held at Wellington College on Saturday, 21 September. While the band usually rehearses on Thursday nights (from 7.00pm to 9.30pm), there will be a break following the contest to hold a formal dinner on Thursday, 26 September, taking the opportunity to present the following awards:

Service to Levin and Districts Brass: Bella Price 5 years, Sam Murray, 5 years, Brian Stewart, 15 years, Marilyn Jeffery, 20 years and Gary Collins, 20 years.

BBANZ Long Service Awards – John Gibbs 46 years, Ray Harvey 52 years and Colin Honey 70 years.

National Band of NZ pins – David Miller, Chris Lawton, David Maas.

As summer approaches, Levin and Districts Brass is looking forward to its end-of-year concert at Speldhurst Country Estate on the outskirts of Levin on Saturday, 23 November - a night not to be missed.

And, we are looking forward to catching up with everyone in Christchurch in 2025 - we have our accommodation booked!








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National Secondary Schools' Brass Band – Course Manager and/or Band Manager

The band held barbeque fundraisers at Mitre 10 and New World Rolleston and held a raffle prior to the national contest. Other successful fundraising events throughout the year have included Christmas carolling, pie sales, and several other sausage sizzles.

Upcoming events for the band include a major concert, "A Sparke of Brilliance", featuring our musical director Raynor Martin playing and conducting, and many Christmas performances as the festive season approaches.

Bras and Brass' latest adventure was in somewhat balmy Christchurch with Addington Brass Band over the last weekend in August. With a theme of 'showing our true colours' the concert quickly became a feast of soloists from both bands. Held at the stunning Knox Church in Bealey Avenue, this latest collaboration of Bras and Brass with a local band proved to be as successful as past events.

Our first soloist, Principal Horn Tania MacKay (Woolston Brass), performed one of the world's most well-known tunes, first made famous by Judy Garland in *The Wizard of Oz*. This arrangement of *Over the Rainbow* by Goff Richards suited Tania's dulcet sound to a tee. Tania has a mantra of doing something every day that scares you! For Tania, this is usually hurtling down a Port Hills mountain bike trail, but on this day, she felt her challenge was doing justice to this beautiful piece. Needless to say, Tania rose to this challenge superbly.

As Bras and Brass evolves, we find talent galore in our ranks. Our Soprano Cornet player, Tracy Wilson, has arranged a number of pieces especially for us. For this concert, with a theme of 'colours', her rendition of Yellow by Coldplay picked up on all the nuances of this piece and shared the central motif around the band, allowing the variety of the lyrics to be mimicked by various instruments instead. It was a compliment indeed when one of the millennial nonbrass-playing sons of the band (and a Coldplay fan) remarked how much he had enjoyed that piece, with the original playing alongside in his head as the band played on. Tracy's quirky and fun arrangement of Brown Eyed Girl had everyone tapping their toes and clapping their hands (on 2 and 4, of course).

This Bras and Brass cohort was very excited

to have Kay MacKenzie as our Principal Cornet and another featured soloist. As well as being a member of the National Band of New Zealand, Kay is Principal Cornet for NBS Nelson City Brass and won the Best Principal Cornet award in the A Grade Own Choice at the recent National Championships. Originally from West Lothian, Scotland, Kay is the consummate performer, and this was evident in her stunning rendition of My Love is like a Red, Red Rose. Kay's smooth playing, rich tones and technical clarity gave life to this nostalgic rendition of this piece and was also a testament to Kay's virtuosity.

Within the band are at least half a dozen musical directors. As well as Michelle Panko (Hamilton City Brass) taking up the baton again for Bras and Brass, we had two guest conductors. Memorie Brooky is a member of Hamilton City Brass, recent musical director of Matamata Brass and the President of the Waikato Bay of Plenty Brass Band Association. Memorie led us through Yellow, and Vickie van Uden directed a beautiful rendition of Sunrise over Blue Ridge by Dan Price. Vickie is the musical director of Woolston Junior Band, Sumner Brass and the National Secondary Schools' Brass Band. Vickie was also a member of the original Boobs and Brass in the United Kingdom, the inspiration for Bras and Brass and is a unique link with both the past and the future of our

The final number by Bras and Brass was *Paint it Black*, and we must mention the excellent audience participation in contributing to this piece's choral aspect, which created an almost ethereal experience in this gorgeous building.

The colour and feature soloist theme continued with Addington Brass, led by Adrian Dalton in the second half. Their Bass Trombone 'guru', Nathan Cottom, brought

to life *Blue John* with rich, some would say juicy, sounding jazzy tones. Addington's percussionist, Reuben Clarkson, presented a very spiky and clever xylophone rendition of *Black and White Rag*, casting the memory of many of the audience back to the 1970s TV show Pot Black. Just like the first half, the depth of talent of Addington was evident when Nikita Smith put her instrument to one side and picked up the microphone for a vibrant rendition of *Orange Coloured Sky*.

Musical directors Adrian and Michelle really understood the assignment of 'colours', so it was only fitting that the two bands came together for a poignant and powerful finale in *The Colour Purple*. From the Broadway musical, this piece speaks of hope, love and a celebration of life. Apt sentiments, given the nature of our mission in supporting not only breast cancer research but also in supporting those in our banding community afflicted by this disease.

Bras and Brass would like to thank Sshmutes, Brass Direct, House of Oom, BBANZ, and Miller Associates for their ongoing support, Knox Church for full access to their facilities, and Woolston Brass for the use of their bandroom. Performance Review: "Buzzing Brass Save the 80s"

At the recent Wellington and Central Districts Brass Band Competition, hosted by Wellington Brass, the Buzzing Brass Wellington Band delivered a unique contesting experience: part brass band concert, part sci-fi comedy show. *The Temporal Melody: 80s Time Quest*, written by Buzz Newton, was a thrilling and often hilarious brass band performance that transported the audience on a timetravelling adventure to the 1980s, combining live music, storytelling, and plenty of comedic moments.

The performance began with the unmistakable voice of Wellington Brass Band's own Tom Baker playing his unique version of Tom Baker's fourth incarnation of The Doctor, dramatically interrupting the band mid-performance with a time-travel emergency. The Daleks, in their usual "exterminate everything" fashion, were on a mission to erase the 1980s by altering its iconic music. The only way to save the decade? A brass band, of course. As the Doctor would say, "Well, what could possibly go wrong?"

The band's mission was clear: they needed to find and play the "Temporal Melody" before the Daleks ruined everyone's favourite decade. Along the way, the audience was treated to some hilarious

musical twists, such as a tuba solo of *The Final Countdown* performed by Mika Hayashi that had the band's director, Buzz, scratching his head, wondering if the Daleks had decided to upgrade their musical sabotage skills. At one point, trombones became the prime target of extermination, with Daleks furiously screaming, "EXTERMINATE the Trombones!"

The humour continued to hit the mark throughout the show, especially when brass band legends Trevor and David Bremner made their grand entrance, decked out in full Ghostbusters gear. David Bremner played his father, Trevor, while his son Louis adorably embodied David. Their onstage banter, coupled with the Ghostbusters theme, was a riot, and the video mashup of the Ghostbusters destroying Daleks will surely be etched in the audience's memory for years to come.

The green-screen filming session directed by Rob Sarkies added yet another layer of comedy and creativity. The sight of band members running from Daleks and using their instruments as bazookas while wearing their brass band uniforms was absurd and delightful. Kate Lineham's narration kept the pace tight, and her dry delivery of more ridiculous plot points made the audience chuckle. The Bremners' playful interactions with the band and a joke involving the conception of the Sshhmute further underscored the light-hearted spirit of the production.

The final showdown with the Daleks did not disappoint. As the band discovered the "Temporal Melody" – in the form of the *Ghostbusters* theme, of course—the Daleks tried desperately to outplay the brass band but were overwhelmed by the sheer musical might of Buzzing Brass. Their frantic cries of "How is this possible? Daleks have the superior rhythm!" had the audience roaring with laughter as the band's triumphant final notes literally exterminated the Daleks.

By the end, the band had saved the 1980s and returned to the present, closing with a powerful reprise of *Beeline*. The audience was left cheering and smiling, undoubtedly wishing they could time-travel back to the start and experience it all over again.

The Temporal Melody: 80s Time Quest was a hilarious and heartwarming blend of brass music, sci-fi adventure, and sharp humour. It was a celebration of both the 80s and the quirky charm of brass band culture, proving that sometimes, the most unlikely heroes, armed with trombones and tubas, can save the day.

Brendan Agnew, nominated by Wellington Brass

After starting piano lessons at age five and trumpet lessons at 11, Brendan enjoyed several years of music-making before joining Auckland City Brass in 2012 and realising what he had been missing.

Moving to Wellington for university, Brendan played with Wellington Brass and Hutt City Brass and made appearances with the NZSO National Youth Orchestra and numerous ensembles at the New Zealand School of Music. Returning to Auckland in late 2015, Brendan worked as an itinerant music teacher, band director, and choir accompanist in several schools and at contests and concerts for many local bands. Taking up the baton at Howick Brass in late 2018, he led them to ABA contest victories in 2018 and 2019 and top-four places at the 2019, 2021 and 2022 national contests.

In January 2019, Brendan returned to Wellington to take on the role of Music Librarian at the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra where he is responsible for all musical material presented to the orchestra, managing commissioning and rental contracts and ensuring copyright compliance.

Between 2020 and 2023, he served as Music Director of the Wellington Youth Sinfonietta. Since stepping down as Music Director, Brendan has remained on the management committee of Wellington Youth Orchestras Inc. (which oversees Wellington Youth Orchestra and Wellington Youth Sinfonietta) as NZSO representative. He is also proud to sit on the committee of Music Futures, a registered charity that offers financial support and performance opportunities to young musicians in the Wellington region.

Having settled in Lower Hutt, Brendan plays cornet for Wellington Brass. He is assistant music director of Upper Hutt Brass and Hutt City Brass, regularly playing soprano cornet for the latter (where his wife Susan

plays third cornet and is band secretary). He frequently plays with other bands nationwide as an assisting musician for contests and concerts.

Brendan's notable banding highlights include being a member of the winning band at the national contest on five occasions across three grades, conducting Wellington Brass in a workshop with Dr Robert Childs, collaborating with soloists of the highest calibre as an accompanist at the Champion of Champions and Invitational Slow Melody, hearing the National Band of 2017 perform his arrangement of Emannuel Séjourné's Marimba Concerto with outstanding soloist Rachel Thomas, and conducting the world premiere of Veni Creator Spiritus composed by Dr Anthony Young, as Howick Brass' sacred item at the 2021 National Contest.

When asked why he's standing for the National Management Committee, Brendan responded: "Having been involved at almost all levels of brass banding in New Zealand since first joining Auckland City Brass, my life is richer from my experiences and the friends I have made. I am keen to ensure the future of New Zealand banding is sustainable, inclusive, accessible, and world-class. Therefore, it seems like a natural progression to join BBANZ's National Management Committee and do my part for an organisation that has done so much for me. My background in music education, community music-making, and professional arts administration all show that I have something to offer."



Sunday, 22 September, saw all of Auckland's banding community descending on Green Bay High School, nestled at the foot of the Waitakere Ranges. Performing in front of adjudicator Lt CMDR Michael Dowrick, eleven bands took part in the Contest this year.

The day started early, with four bands competing in the Youth Section: Auckland City Youth Brass, Maamaloa Youth Brass, North Shore Youth Brass and Auckland Seventh Day Adventist High School Brass. Backing up from their win at the Nationals in July, ASDAH Brass performed an ambitious programme featuring Principal Cornet Anastasia Ika, playing the everpopular Concerto de Aranjuez. Despite their fine performance, they were out-scored this year by Maamaloa Youth Brass. Conducted by Langi Mausia, the band made a clean sweep of all trophies: the Championship trophy, the Soloist trophy - awarded to Eliesa Mausia for his performance of Mr Marcello's Adagio - and the Doreen Thorne Trophy, awarded to

the Best Compere, Ungatea Mausia. Truly a family affair! The younger bands of Auckland City Youth and North Shore Youth took out third and fourth, respectively.

Next was the A Section, comprising defending champions North Shore Brass with Waitakere Auckland Brass and Auckland City Brass. This year, a different format was adopted as the "Entertainment" section of the contest was dropped and replaced with bands performing a Major Work, Reflective Item, March and a piece featuring a band soloist.

Performing an old favourite - Harmony Music - North Shore Brass, conducted by Harmen Vanhoorne, took out the Championship, winning all three band categories and the Best Compere award, going to Keegan Lane. Mark Bingham from Auckland City Brass won the Soloist Trophy, performing Gareth Wood's Dance Sequence. Waitakere were awarded second place with a riveting performance of Afterlife by Stijn Aertgeerts.

The afternoon session featured four bands competing in the B Section: Howick Brass, Kumeu Brass, Maamaloa Brass and Papakura Brass. This section was fiercely contested, with Maamaloa Brass, the current National D Grade champions, performing *Vitae Aeternum* and winning the title for the first time. As with the Youth section, Maamaloa Brass took home all the trophies, including the Best Soloist award, won by euphonium player Toui'anga Puleiku. Second place went to Papakura Brass, with third place awarded to Howick Brass.

All in all, a long day and a successful contest. We thank LT CMDR Michael Dowrick for his concentration and helpful and precise comments. Also, our thanks to Contest Manager Kathy McDonald, ABA Secretary Peter Whyte and President Mark Close, for their efforts in running a smooth contest.



Next-Gen

In this issue, we interview 9-year-old Celine Wu, who plays cornet for North Shore Youth Brass and trumpet in North Shore Symphonic Winds.

What was your first musical experience?

I started on the piano at five years old and the flute when I was six. I didn't enjoy either; one day, I was asked to try the trumpet. I made a buzz right away and loved it. I thought it was the coolest instrument. My teacher, Mark Close, started teaching me basics and invited me to his youth band later.

Describe how musical ability runs through your family.

My sister plays the clarinet.

To date, what have been some of your musical highlights?

Winning the National Under 15 cornet section last year after playing for one year, playing at Carnegie Hall in New York City this year, and also playing Last Post at the ANZAC Commemorations. (Ed. Celine won the Young Musicians (5 to 9 years) section of the 2023 American Protégé International Woodwinds and Brass Competition. This win awarded her the opportunity to perform at Carnegie Hall. Celine was one of two recipients to receive the Judges' Distinction Award Trophy. Here's a video about Celine's trip to New York

What have you gained or enjoyed most about playing at the National Contest?

The National Contest taught me that being nervous can actually help you focus. I've learned how to channel that nervous energy into performing well, and I enjoy the challenge of competing alongside other talented musicians.

What sort of things would you like to see happen to support young players?

More youth workshops.

Who has been your greatest inspiration?

Tine Thing Helseth, because she stays strong and hopeful, even while facing a serious illness like cancer.

What's the best thing about being in a brass band?

The best part is playing music with others and meeting kids who share the same passion. Being in a band teaches you teamwork, and it's fun to be part of something bigger than just yourself.

Is there anyone you would like to thank for helping you with your achievements thus far?

I'd like to thank my parents for always supporting me, from buying me instruments to helping with practise and being there for every performance. I also want to thank my teachers, especially Mark Close, Orsen Paine, Charlie Porter, Liam Wright, and Josh Rogan. I also want to thank Dave Fiu for his incredible support; even though he's not my teacher—he's always encouraged me along the way.

What do you hope to achieve in the future?

If I get the opportunity, I dream of becoming a trumpet soloist. Otherwise, an engineer of some sort, maybe potato science!

What type of music do you listen to most? Classical, like a maniac.

Other interests? Origami, drawing, cooking.

Favourite food? Start with a rich, cheesy potato gratin and crispy rosemary-seasoned potato wedges dipped in savoury potato gravy. 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Mouth plece

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The theme for this year's National Secondary Schools' Brass Band training course, Kia Kotahi Tātau (We Are One), was meaningful and brought a sense of unity and purpose. While some may look at the logistical challenges of bringing 82 students together, the management team (Vickie van Uden, Linda Filimoehala, Leigh Martin and myself) worked purposefully to provide a hearty programme for the week, particularly aided by Sue Ford and her team of helpful band staff who coordinated the non-band activities throughout the week.

I wish to thank our highly talented guest soloists, Kay MacKenzie and Mike Ford, who also joined the tutoring team alongside David Maas, Ray Farrow, Ross Gerritsen, Hamilton (Toni) Lea, Aishah Leitner, Elliot Gray, Leigh Martin, Jordan Seaton, Aimee Moore and Rebecca Keoghan. Thanks also to our exceptional support staff Sue Ford, Michael and Anna Playford, Matt Maunsell-Terry, Vicki Flavall, Don Peng and Linda Kendrick. This large-scale event could not have happened without a highly skilled team who demonstrated whakawhaungatanga (relating well with

others) and manaakitanga (respect and care for others); this followed through to how our students connected on and off the stage during the intense week of rehearsals.

A brief guide to the week that was:

Combined band rehearsals, separate band rehearsals, sectionals with our tutors, rehearsals with guest soloists, pizza night, the ensemble challenge, plus non-band activities, including team building, problemsolving, quizzes and novelty games. Meals eaten together in the dining hall, team photographs and a video recorded by Jean-Luc Pitcathily from the New Zealand Army Band (to be released shortly).

Saturday's concert began with Karakia (prayer) and opening hīmene (hymn) Ka Waiata Ki A Maria. The choir consisted of the NSSBB Development Band, a selection of NSSBB musicians and band staff. Accompanied by the NSSBB band, they produced an emotional rendition that brought some performers and audience members to tears. It was a sensational start, and reflective of the week we had had together. The NSSBB Development

Band then presented their programme including a modern test piece, *Flight* and toe-tappers such as *My Favourite Things* and *You Can't Stop the Beat*. Guest Soloist Kay MacKenzie played a jaw-dropping rendition of *The Flying Scot*, which left the audience mesmerised by her technical skills.

The intermission between the two bands saw Principal percussionist Jacob Hickman and his team perform the *Flight of the Bumble Bee*. Vickie van Uden selected the music and suggested that Jacob organise a team to perform. It was great seeing this student-led project reach such a high standard in a few short days.

The NSSBB programme began with *Children of Sanchez*, involving the second and third cornets playing notes into the bells of the tuba section. Prinicpal cornet Luca Cable played a stunning solo of *Anthem* from the musical *Chess*. Guest soloist Mike Ford played *Enter the Dance*, and Kay MacKenzie performed *Wondrous Day* and *Nancy's Girl* written for her by John Barber. The band played a selection from the test piece *Plantagenets*, which stretched many players.

The grand finale saw the combined bands performing *Libertango, Telephone* and *Locked out of Heaven*. If you have ever heard 82 players together, you know what a powerful, wonderful sound came from the stage. By all reports, the concert was a huge success and was enjoyed by friends, family and members of the Nelson community, who came out in their droves. 




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A month or two ago, I wrote an application to BBANZ for a 72-year-long service award to be presented to Les Green QSM. I set aside a couple of hours to make sure it was accurate and compelling. Ten minutes in, and I was done! It was simply a one-liner highlighting Les's membership of St Kilda Brass from 1950 until 2022 when he finally handed on his last administrative role.

In late September, family, past National Band, St Kilda colleagues, and a contingent of current 'Saints' and friends gathered in Christchurch, where Les and Maureen recently moved. It was a truly global event with son Andrew, a handy trombone player himself, jetting in from California and a nephew from Melbourne.

BBANZ Executive Officer, Helen Lee graciously agreed to present Les with his certificate and his National Band pin and, along with a number of other speakers, spoke of Les's contribution to the band and the wider movement and shared personal insights.

Maureen had managed to find two judges' reports from the St Kilda Band solo competitions of 1950 and 1952. The 1950 judge was Norman Thorn Snr, who at that time was the New Zealand soprano cornet champion and had yet to embark on his illustrious conducting career. In 1950, Les still had a wee way to go, and Norman gave him some tips for improvement, but by 1952, Les was seen as a player with a big future!

Les's time in the movement has been truly remarkable. As a player, his service to the St Kilda band has all been on Tenor Horn. He maintained very high playing standards; his consistency and reliability were his hallmarks. Les built an impressive portfolio of placings in national solos and was a member of the 1965, 76, 80 and 89 National Bands. Most recently, an annual scholarship, jointly funded by St Kilda Brass and the Masonic Charitable Trust (Les's other great interest), has been set up in his name.

Beyond this, Les has been a committee member, Secretary, Treasurer and President of St Kilda Brass. He is a life member of the band. Les served as President of the OSBBA and is a life member. He served on the organising committee for five national contests and was a member of the national association's executive committee, including as its Treasurer for several years. Les only relinquished his last administrative role as St Kilda's representative on the Southern Brass Academy in 2022.

The afternoon was a great occasion. It was wonderful to see a room full of kindred spirits and to listen to the conversation. While the

band movement is about music, it is also about much more, a point made by Les in his response.

Thank you to Helen Lee for organising the award in short order and for her presentation and, of course, to Les's wife Maureen, who gathered the troops and hosted the gathering.

Few of the original senior bandsmen, who came together to form a brass band as part of Christchurch Aged Concern's 'Older and Bolder Activities Week' in 1993, would have anticipated that 31 years later, the band they formed would still be thriving.

Only one of their number, Bob Keyes, is still an active member. He has seen over 80 new players join the ranks over the years. The average age of the members is around 70 years. On any practise day there are approximately 2,000 years of total playing experience sitting around the stands!

The 50s Up Brass is an ideal brass band to play in. There is only one practise a week, no evening engagements, no band fees and definitely no marching. The band usually performs concerts about fifteen times a year in rest home villages, Christchurch halls, nearby community centres in rural areas, Workingmen's Clubs and special occasions. These have included City Council commissions, a world ploughing championship, an international Probus conference, retail entertainment gigs and funerals of members and friends of the band.

Every Wednesday morning, the New Brighton Bandroom comes to life at 9.30am. The local residents have two hours of intermittent entertainment as the old boys and girls make merry music, enjoy each other's company and prove they can still meet the challenges that their music demands.

The band's playing over the years has been of a consistently good standard and has attracted large audiences to many of its concerts. During the first decade of the 21st century, the band played to full houses at the Christchurch Town Hall. Suzanne Prentice, Toni Williams, Hayley Westenra, Malvina Major, and the Topp Twins were among the artists featured. In 2023 and 2024, the band presented variety concerts in the Lady Isaac Royal Theatre featuring Yulia and Suzanne Prentice.

It all goes to show that age is merely a number. Mel Smith, who passed away recently, started his banding in 1927 and finally resigned from the 50s Up Brass in 2021 at the ripe old age of 100. He was still playing solo cornet and was also second trumpet in the Risingholme Community Orchestra.

Next-Gen

In this issue, Lachlan Spence interviews 15-year-old Anessa Ginever, the principal trombone of the National Secondary Schools' Band, who plays for Hamilton City Brass and Morrinsville College Jazz Band.

How did you come to join a brass band?

My dad, Quentin, played trumpet when he was a teenager. My big brother Leighton started to play cornet at Intermediate School through tuition with Tracey Seifert, so Dad thought he'd pick up where he left off at high school. Alongside Leighton, my dad played in the Hamilton Brass Factory, a development band for new players. My mum Sandra and I would watch them, and soon my mum wanted to join in too, claiming it to be 'too much fun to miss out on'. Dad told Mum he always wanted to play the trombone (Why wouldn't he?), so he bought one only to discover he couldn't blow a note. Thus, he stuck to the cornet and gave Mum the trombone. So Dad and Leighton were in the Hamilton Auxiliary Band, and Mum was in Brass Factory. I would travel to the band room with them every week and sit in the corner listening. I was seven years old when I decided I wanted to play trombone 'to be just like mum'. Slowly moving up the ranks in Brass Factory into the Auxiliary Band, and now here I am, one of the second trombonists for Hamilton City Brass alongside my buddies: Malcom Barr, Mike Rogers, and Stephen Towers.

Describe how musical ability runs through your family.

On my dad's side, I have ancestors who played in a Collery Band in Wales and one of the English Army Bands. On my mum's side, I have an ancestor who was a luthier (A Violin maker).

To date, what have been some of your musical highlights?

One of my biggest highlights would have to be playing in the A Grade earlier this year with Hamilton City Brass, as it was the first time I played with a band on a national stage. I really enjoyed our incredible challenge-inducing test piece: Goldberg 2012. I felt proud being able to play Goldberg alongside other amazing musicians and feel like I was contributing to the band. Walking up on stage, seeing the people in the audience and knowing that I had a job to do and I was capable of doing it. All the practise was leading up to this moment, and I couldn't help but smile as I walked off stage. Another highlight would be playing in the Junor Champion of Champions and then rushing off to band practise, where everyone gave me a round of applause.

What have you gained from being in the Secondary Schools' Band?

In 2023, when I was in Year 9, I completed my first recorded audition for the National



Secondary Schools' Band. When the list came out, I couldn't believe it! Principal Trombone in the NSSBB! I had tears in my eyes and a big smile; I was overjoyed. Principle trombonist alongside Logan Ready. NSSBB is an amazing experience, and I highly recommend it for young brass and percussion players. On the NSSBB course, the trombone sections had the extraordinary tutors Mark Close and Mark Bingham and the guest trombone soloist Aishah Leitner. This year, I completed the audition for NSSBB and received the result of the principal trombone.

What sort of things would you like to happen to support young players?

More workshop days! I have learnt so much from workshops led by various brass players; it would be great to have regional workshop days so that people don't have to spend money or travel far to learn.

Who or what has been your greatest inspiration?

The musicians in Hamilton City Brass inspire me each week. I come to rehearsal to be a better player and to go to band practise, knowing I can contribute something I'm proud of. Aishah Leitner is also an inspiration to me. I had the opportunity to hear her winning solo in the Open Trombone at Nationals this year, and it was an incredible and well-deserved win.

What's the best thing about being in a brass band?

The community is remarkable, most people want to see you succeed and encourage you to do so, friends will give advice when needed and I am grateful for that. I enjoy the playful banter between sections about which instrument is the best (we all know

it's the trombone).

Is there anyone you would like to thank for helping you with your achievements thus far?

My mum and dad for helping me get to events such as Nationals and NSSBB and encouraged me every step of the way. My grandparents - they often come to our performances. My first tutor, Tracey Seifert, for starting me on this journey and my current tutor, Mr Colin Smith, for sharing your boundless knowledge.

What do you hope to achieve in the future?

One of my musical goals is to play *Slavische Fantasy* by Carl Hohne. I'll finish high school and maybe go to university to study music and/or animation. One of my life goals is to write and publish a book.

Wellington/Central Combined Contest

Everyone knows that you can't beat Wellington on a good day, so it was fortunate that the weather was smiling on the capital on the 21st of September for the combined Wellington and Central Districts Brass Band Competition.

The contest ran over a single sunny day at Wellington College, with 12 bands competing across two sections. Wellington College was a great venue with excellent performance and warm-up spaces. Arguably, the highlight was the Buzzing Brass fundraiser food stall, with the table groaning under the weight of a huge array of cakes and savoury items.

The WDBBA, in consultation with the CDBBA, trialled a new format for the contest where bands had a "one and done" own choice performance which included a major work, reflective item and a selection of entertainment pieces. Most bands chose to roll these up into a cohesive concert presentation, with many bands also including some slick and entertaining audiovisual elements.

WDBBA was excited to include a trial of an award for the best performance of a work by a New Zealand composer. It was fantastic to see how much New Zealand music was performed across both sections, with some bands choosing New Zealand pieces for

more than one category.

We were very fortunate to have two wonderful musical adjudicators, Peter Adams (Professor Emeritus, Otago University) for Section 1 and Shannon Pittaway (NZSO Principal Bass Trombone and Head of Brass and Wind at Victoria University) for Section 2. The entertainment marks were ably awarded by Aaron Lloydd and Rangimakehu Hall, who have several lifetimes of musical performance experience between them (not that we would suggest anyone is old!).

No contest runs without volunteers, and we were very grateful to all the amazing people who helped to make the contest a success, including:

- Dave Merrall, Sue Myhill, Emily Richards, Mark Davey, Paula Weir, Callum Mallett and the volunteer team from Wellington Brass.
- Brad Mancer, fairy godmother extraordinaire, who expertly beautified the programme
- Darrell Harvey and Mike Ashton from Wellington College who were the most amazing hosts. If there was a "nothing is too much trouble" award, they would be the winners.
- Alastair Isdale and the Air Force Band and

Wellington Brass for kindly loaning and transporting their percussion equipment.

- Steve Davey and Darren Smith from Music Works for the loan of the Yamaha Drum Kit
- Andrew Weir and Martyn Smith for their technical skills and loaning their sound gear for judges' comments.

A huge thanks to every band in the combined districts for the time and energy they had put into making some clever and entertaining programmes. Whanganui's news bulletin and Buzzing Brass' "Dr Who Rescues the 80" were standouts, but there were wonderful and entertaining innovations across both sections, and the audience clearly loved the variety. The WDBBA truly appreciates the willingness of the bands to make the most of the trial format, and we will be very interested to hear the feedback on the trial once our survey goes out to bands.

While music was definitely the winner on the day, the judges had to make tough decisions on how the marks and awards would fall. Many thanks to Peter and Shannon for their insightful comments and the positive energy they brought to the task. It's a tough job, and we're glad that we had such talented people to do it.

One of the most prominent members of our banding fraternity in New Zealand and a Life Member of the Brass Band Association of New Zealand, Rodney Sutton, euphonium virtuoso and Musical Director, passed away on the 1st of November 2024. He was 89 years old.

Rodney came from a musical family. His father and two uncles played in the now-defunct Dominion Band in Invercargill. His mother was a particularly good piano, viola, and cello player, and his two sisters played piano and sang in choirs. One of those sisters was a very successful itinerant percussion teacher.

Rodney's early musical performances were as a boy soprano, and he won singing competitions in Invercargill, Dunedin, and Christchurch. The road to becoming a euphonium player was somewhat winding. On the way, he played fife, bugle, baritone, side drum, and timpani, all with a degree of success. It was Claude Miller, then the Musical Director of the Invercargill Garrison Band, who, in 1950, suggested he play euphonium. In 1952, he had his first start in the national open euphonium championship and in 1953, his first win at age seventeen. He went on to win that title a total of 13 times.

In later years, he added three consecutive wins in the veteran's solo (now called the Masters). He won the Champion of Champions four times, one of those times being the first person to win that title from the veteran's section. Rodney also had considerable success in duet and quartet

competitions both in New Zealand and Australia.

Rodney played euphonium in three National Bands of New Zealand: 1962, 1965, and 1967. In 1962, he was a stand-up soloist with the National Band, playing an arrangement by Norman Henstridge of Mozart's *Bassoon Concerto*. A critic from the British Bandsman, a then-weekly publication, said:

"This player, Mr. Sutton of Invercargill, has nothing to learn in this country, for his playing of a movement from Mozart's *Bassoon Concerto* set up a new standard for even this home of brass playing. It was an amazing exhibition of virtuosity with almost virtuoso-type accompaniments. No euphonium player, be he soloist or aspirant, should miss the opportunity of hearing this exponent of euphonium playing,"

After that tour, Rodney received a letter from the famous Munn & Felton's Works Band (now The GUS Band), the national champion band of Great Britain in 1960. Their principal euphonium player, the legendary Bert Sullivan, was retiring. The letter offered Rodney his seat. Fortunately for Invercargill and New Zealand, Rodney chose to stay in Invercargill and join his father's business.

Rodney was appointed Musical Director of the Invercargill Garrison Band in 1969, won the B Grade national championship with the band in 1970 and then the A Grade national championship in 1973. This was the first time since 1959 that a band outside the four main centres had won an A Grade championship and the last time to date. Rodney was also the Assistant Musical Director and then Musical Director of the National Youth Band.

In 1980, there were eight applicants for the position of Musical Director of the National Band of New Zealand, one of the largest number of applicants ever for that position. From that highly competitive group, Rodney was the successful applicant and led the band on a successful tour of the United States of America, where the band was given standing ovations. The impetus for that selection was his undoubted musicality.

During his playing career, Rodney was the first-choice selection for tenor tuba in the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra when one was required. On one such occasion, he toured Australia with the orchestra, reuniting Rodney with the leader of the orchestra, Alex Lindsay, an old family friend. Rodney also hosted a radio programme featuring brass band music in Invercargill for 14 years.

In 1982, Rodney was made a Member of the British Empire for services to the community and in 2004, he received an Invercargill City Council Performing Arts Award. He was a Life Member of the Invercargill Garrison Band Society.

BBANZ Life Membership

Denis Spurdle was unanimously elected as a Life Member of the Brass Band Association of New Zealand at the recent Annual General Meeting. John Sullivan read the nomination on behalf of the national management committee.

Denis Spurdle has been an active and contributory member of the New Zealand brass band scene for over 50 years. His musical career began with the New Lynn Brass Band (now Waitakere Brass), and as a member of this band, he was selected for the 1973 and 1976 National Youth Bands and won the Australian Eb Bass Championship solo. Nineteen years into his banding journey, Denis joined the New Zealand Army Band and was deployed to Singapore with the 1st Royal New Zealand Infantry Regiment Band in 1986 for a two-year posting. In January 1993, Corporal Spurdle was appointed Bandmaster of the New Zealand Army Band and Acting Director of Music for six months. In 1997, Sergeant Spurdle began an influential tenure as Senior Instructor of the Army School of Music, implementing professional development programmes that have endured to this day. Denis was also a member of the 1992 National Band of New Zealand.

While based in Christchurch, Denis joined Woolston Brass and also played with Ashburton Silver Band. Denis was also appointed Musical Director of Woolston Junior Band in 1999, taking the band to its first national contest in 2000, where it won the D Grade and again in 2001. The band was

promoted to the C Grade and won that grade in 2004. During his five years at the helm of Woolston Junior Band, he was greatly involved in training many young musicians who had successful musical careers. The Canterbury Association also benefited from Denis's talents as an administrator as he organised and ran district youth camps and contests. In 2004, he assisted the Christchurch National Contest Committee and was awarded BBANZ Administrator of the Year for his services to the Canterbury Provincial Brass Band Association.

Denis transferred to the Royal New Zealand Air Force (RNZAF) as Bandmaster of the Base Auckland Band in 2024. While in Auckland, Denis was a member of North Shore Brass for eight years. Now it was Auckland's turn to benefit from Denis's administrative experience as he took ownership of venue management for both the 2007 and 2011 North Shore National Contests. Denis also started his long tenure as a National Contest Supervisor during this period.

In 2007, he was awarded the Chief of Air Force commendation for work with the Base Auckland Band "for revitalising the unit and increasing their public profile."

In 2012, Denis was appointed Bandmaster of the RNZAF Central Band in Wellington. This move led to tenures as a playing member of Marlborough District Brass and Porirua Brass. Once again, Denis's administrative skills were called upon as a member of the 2017 Wellington Contest Committee. With all the experience gained from four National contest committees and many years as a contest supervisor and marching judge, Denis was appointed the Chief Marching Judge in 2020 and Contest Manager in 2021.

A strong focus for Denis is his enthusiasm and energy for helping young musicans. The years of performing and banding at various levels have equipped Denis with the skills to communicate effectively with players of any age. He inspires and nurtures the next generation of brass musicians. Combined with his administrative talents, he has been called on to be a tutor and part of the management team at the National Secondary School and National Youth Bands.

Over half a century, Denis has played, taught, conducted, adjudicated, supervised, and managed at regional and national levels. He has developed a reputation for quiet professionalism, and I would be surprised if there was anyone more highly regarded and respected across the banding fraternity. His unique blend of musical talent, administrative skills, and dedication to nurturing young talent make him a standout candidate for Life Membership. He continues to make an outstanding contribution to our organisation and, as highlighted above, has given years of service to help others be the best they can be. Denis is an excellent example of a lifetime commitment, turning his interest into a career highlighted with flawless leadership that has brought great enjoyment to so many.



Conference and AGM

Now in its third year, the conference workshops are proving a popular event alongside our AGM weekend. This year once again saw strong interest in the financial/administration-based workshops. Thank you to Owen Melhuish and Wayne Jennens for their Bright Ideas on funding and promotion, Grant Langdon for leading the discussion on preparing your new constitution and Brian Nicholas for summarising the feedback and information received from 40 bands in the recent survey.

Mark Close and Vickie van Uden began the music-based sessions with a step-by-step guide on how to start new brass players. This was followed by a session led by Byron Newton and Adrian Dalton on how to start a development band programme.

Thanks to the Kiwi Gaming Foundation and JEANZ Production Ltd, all workshop sessions were live-streamed, a successful initiative that allowed us to connect with a wider audience and receive positive feedback from those watching.

"This has been very interesting indeed. Thank you for live streaming. New Plymouth Jay Band." "I saw a very awesome and constructive workshop and watched it live through Facebook from Fiji. I am the current Music Director and educator for the Fiji National Youth Marching Band. Watching it live, there were many great things I learnt."

Those who attended the sessions agreed it was a valuable opportunity to gain information and ask questions. But best of all was the opportunity to share ideas and chat with people in similar situations. The management committee will run this event next year, so let us know what sessions you'd like to entice you to attend.

Quick notes from the AGM meeting:

The results of the BBANZ election were announced, with Wayne Jennens returning to the management committee and Brendan Agnew joining it.

The delegates endorsed an application from the Ascot Park Hotel Brass to host the 2027 National Contest in Invercargill.

The delegates also agreed on adopting the draft constitution, which will be refined before being presented at next year's AGM.

And good news - there is no increase in the affiliation fees for 2025/2026.

As expected, the discussion on the Remits was passionate and lengthy. All test music will now be announced 170 days before the contest; accompanists and contest supervisors can now start in the national solos without having competed at a Districts Contest, and the contest entry fee has been increased. But the Sacred Item remains at 8 minutes, the Masters solo remains for players aged 55 and over and those wanting to enter the Open Solo Melody still need to qualify before the closing date of contest entries

The final word on the weekend comes from two people attending their first BBANZ AGM... "We got so much out of the AGM weekend, particularly the workshops and networking with others from around the country."



Frédéric Théodoloz grew up in the heart of the Valais brass bands with La Marcelline de Grône, his village band, and Brass Band 13 Etoiles Brass Band. From an early age, he distinguished himself at national solo competitions, winning the title of Swiss Cadet Champion at the Swiss National Competition in 1994 and first place at the Swiss Soloists and Ensembles Competition in 1993. At 15, he joined Roland Schnorhk's trombone class at the Conservatoire Supérieur de Musique of Geneva. Frédéric obtained his professional trombone diploma in 1996 and his master's degree in performance in 2000. From 1995 to 2011, he built up solid experience as an orchestral musician, performing regularly with the Lausanne Chamber Orchestra, the Orchestre de la Suisse Romande, the Sinfonietta de Lausanne, the Geneva Chamber Orchestra and the National Youth Orchestra. During his career as an orchestral musician, he has held successive positions as trombonist with the Porto National Orchestra, the Durban Philharmonic Orchestra, the Aosta Symphony Orchestra and the Musique des Lumières Orchestra.

In 2010, he joined Jean-Claude Kolly's wind ensemble conducting class, and in 2013 obtained his Master of Arts in Music from the Haute Ecole de Musique de Lausanne. He went on to perfect his skills and collaborate with some of the great names on the brass band scene, including Prof. David King, Allan Withington, Robert Childs, Nicholas Childs, Martin Winter, James Gourlay, Garry Cutt, Reid Gilje, Russel Gray and Ivan Meylemans.

From 2012 to 2016, Frédéric conducted Brass Band Fribourg. During this period, he twice won the runner-up title at the Swiss Open Contest in Lucerne and the title of Swiss Champion at the national competition in Montreux in 2012. This title enabled him to defend the Swiss colours at the European Brass Band Championships in Oslo in 2013. From 2009 to 2018, he also led the Echo de la Dent-Blanche des Haudères (1st division band) and the Indépendante de Charrat from 2004 to 2009 (2nd division band).

In addition to working with numerous bands in Switzerland and abroad (Norway, France, Italy) as a musical adviser, guest conductor or adjudicator, Frédéric is the artistic director of the National Youth Orchestra des Jeunesses Musicales Suisse and has collaborated with such renowned soloists as Jeroen Berwaerts, Lionel Cottet and Giovanni



di Angeli.

Frédéric currently conducts La Lyre de Conthey (1st division band) and l'Edelweiss d'Orsières (1st Division band). In 2018, he took over the lead of Brass Band 13 Etoiles, with which he won the Swiss Open Contest in Lucerne on three occasions (2019, 2021 and 2023) and the Swiss Nationals in 2022 and 2023. In May 2023 and 2024, he won the European titles at the European Brass Band Championships in Malmö, Sweden and Palanga, Lithuania, and the British Open Contest in Birmingham in September 2024. He was named 'Conductor of the Year' in December 2023 by the website '4barsrest' and nominated and shortlisted for 'Valais Star 2024' by 'Le Nouvelliste'. He is also cofounder of the BPM Festival with his friend Ludovic Neurohr.

Nick Johnson BA MA PGCE LRSM LTCL ALCM

Originally from the UK, Nick Johnson is a Staff Sergeant and the Bandmaster of the New Zealand Army Band.

Before moving to New Zealand he was the Warrant Officer Class One Bandmaster of the Welsh Guards Band based in London, providing high profile ceremonial musical support within the Household Division. During 24 years of service with the British Army he toured throughout Europe, North America and the Caribbean, as well as operational tours to Iraq, Cyprus, and the Balkans. On completing his service he qualified and worked as a school teacher.

Moving to New Zealand and enlisting into the New Zealand Army in 2009, Nick has performed with the Band as a trombonist throughout New Zealand and the UK, Switzerland, Germany, Turkey, the UAE, China, Tonga, Singapore and Australia.

Nick led the New Zealand Army Band's School of Music, where he prepared

musicians in their musical development as part of their trade employment. This role also included managing and instructing in the Mutual Assistance Programme, a 9-month course for military musicians from various Pacific Islands and Southeast Asian defence forces. As part of this role, Nick deployed to a number of Pacific nations, not only as an instructor but also to provide guidance on how to grow and develop music capabilities.

Nick assumed the role of Bandmaster of the New Zealand Army Band in January 2024.

What was your first musical experience?

My first musical experience was playing guitar in Year 4. I joined the 4Bs at Nor'west when I started trombone in Year 7, and then Adrian Dalton suggested I switch to tuba in Year 8.

My teacher Adrian Dalton for being patient with me, Nic Scott for jamming with me before Provincials and Andrew Couper for picking up my tuba and dropping it home when I left it behind after a concert.

What do you hope to achieve in the future?

I'd like to study music overseas after high school and join the NZ Army Band one day.
